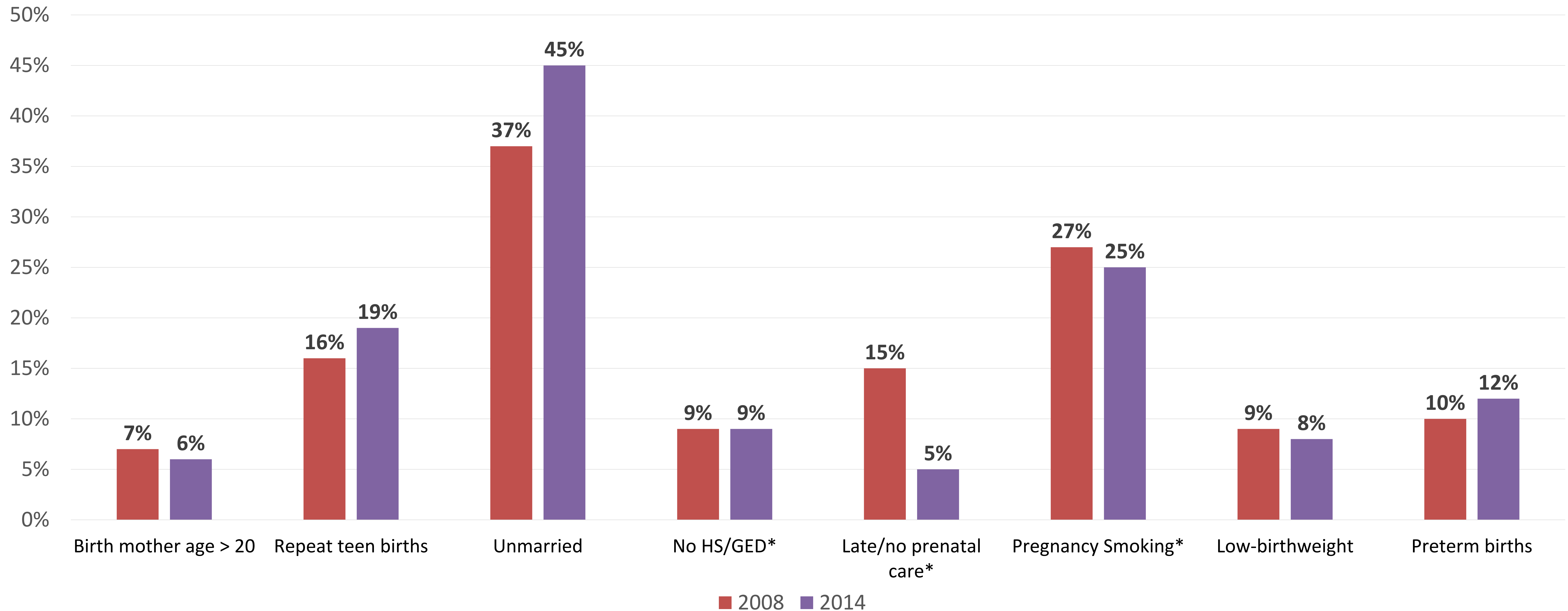

Percent of Babies Born to Women in Ypsilanti Township, 2008 vs 2014



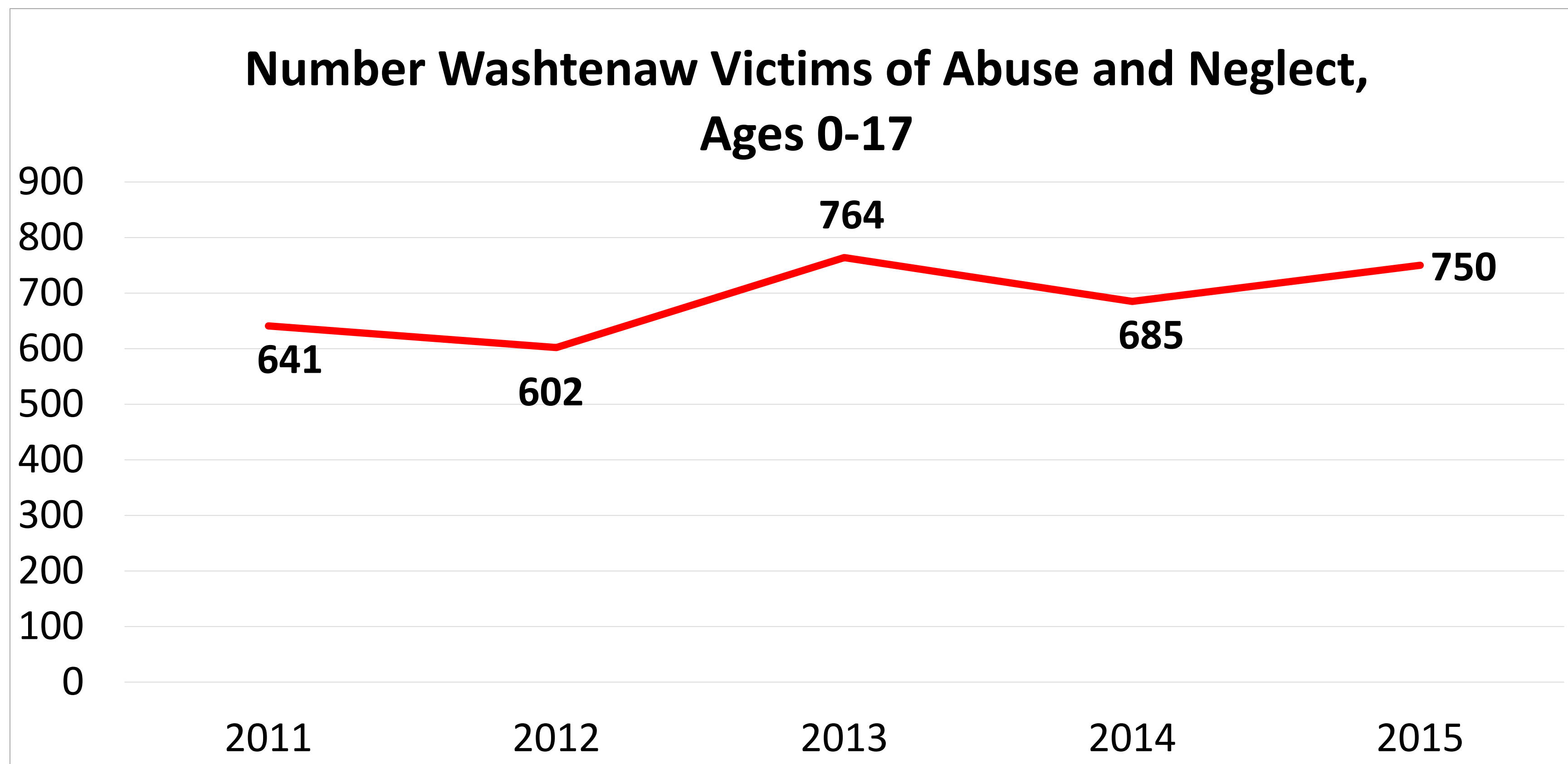
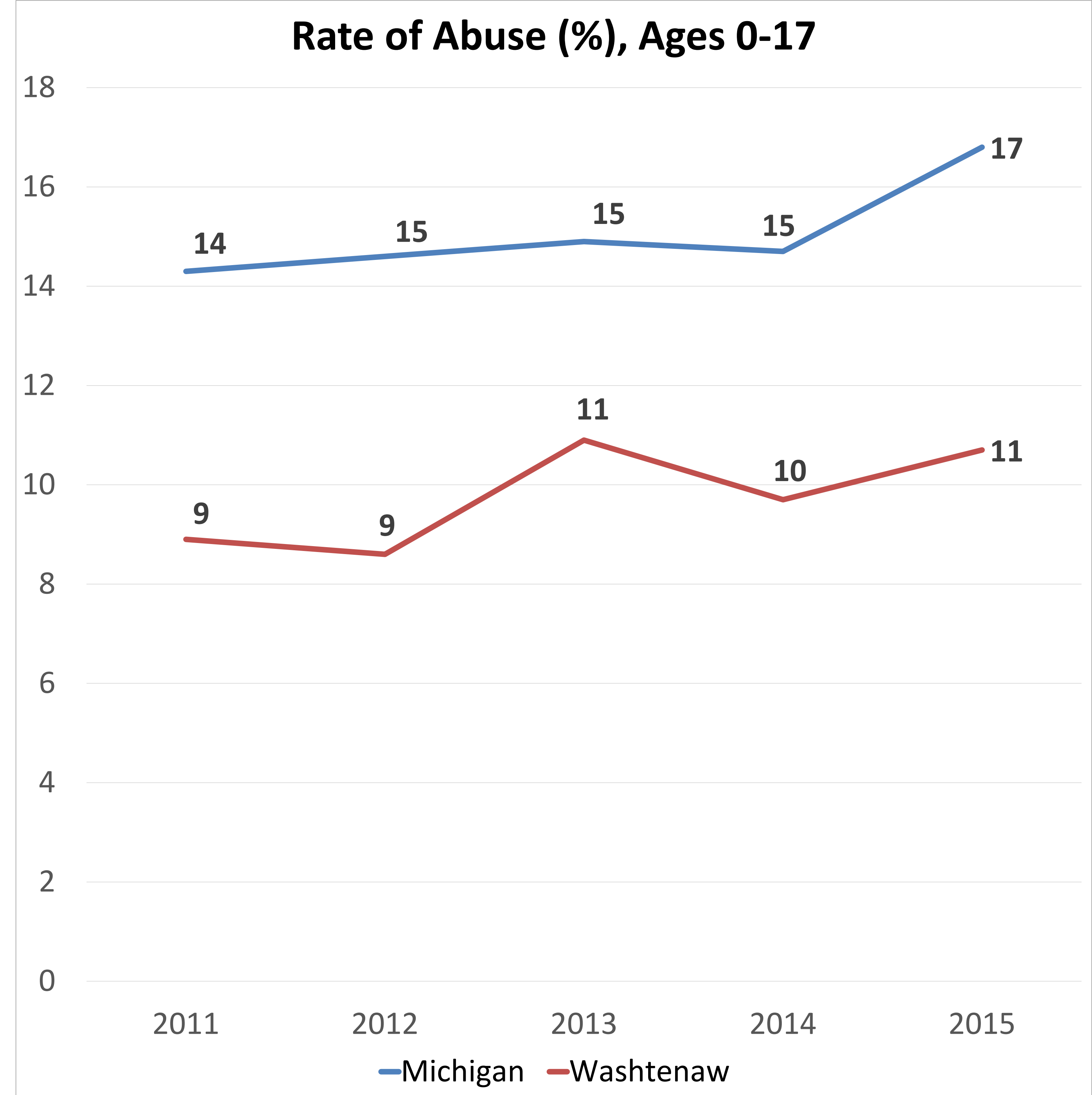
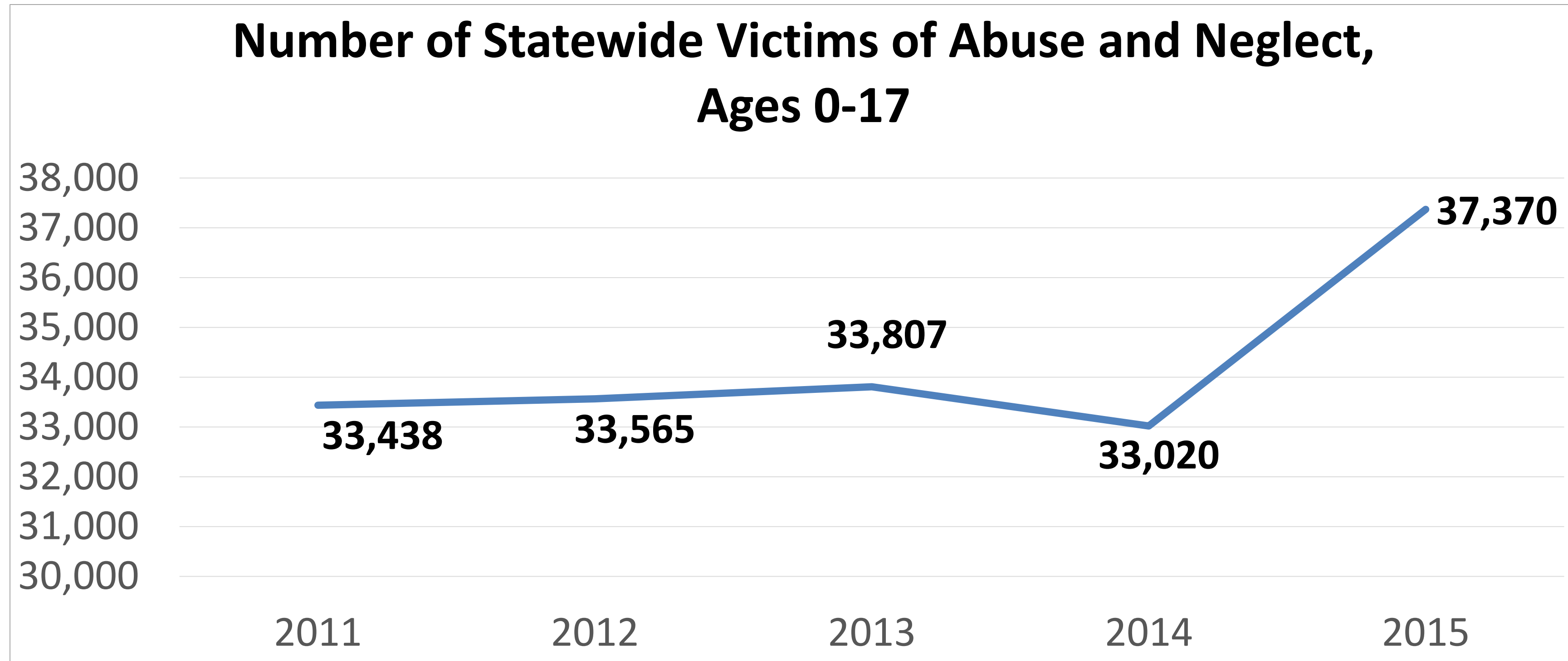

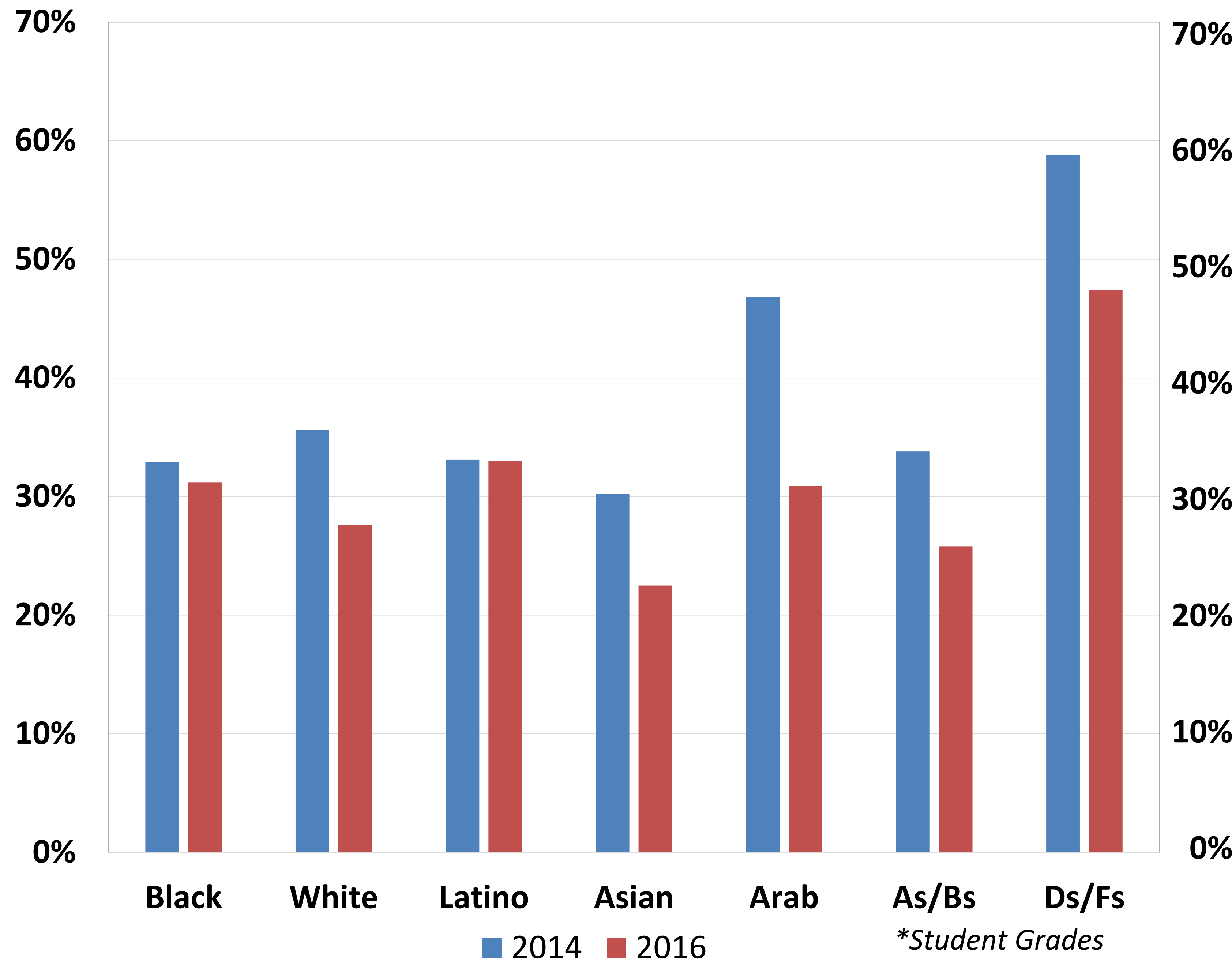

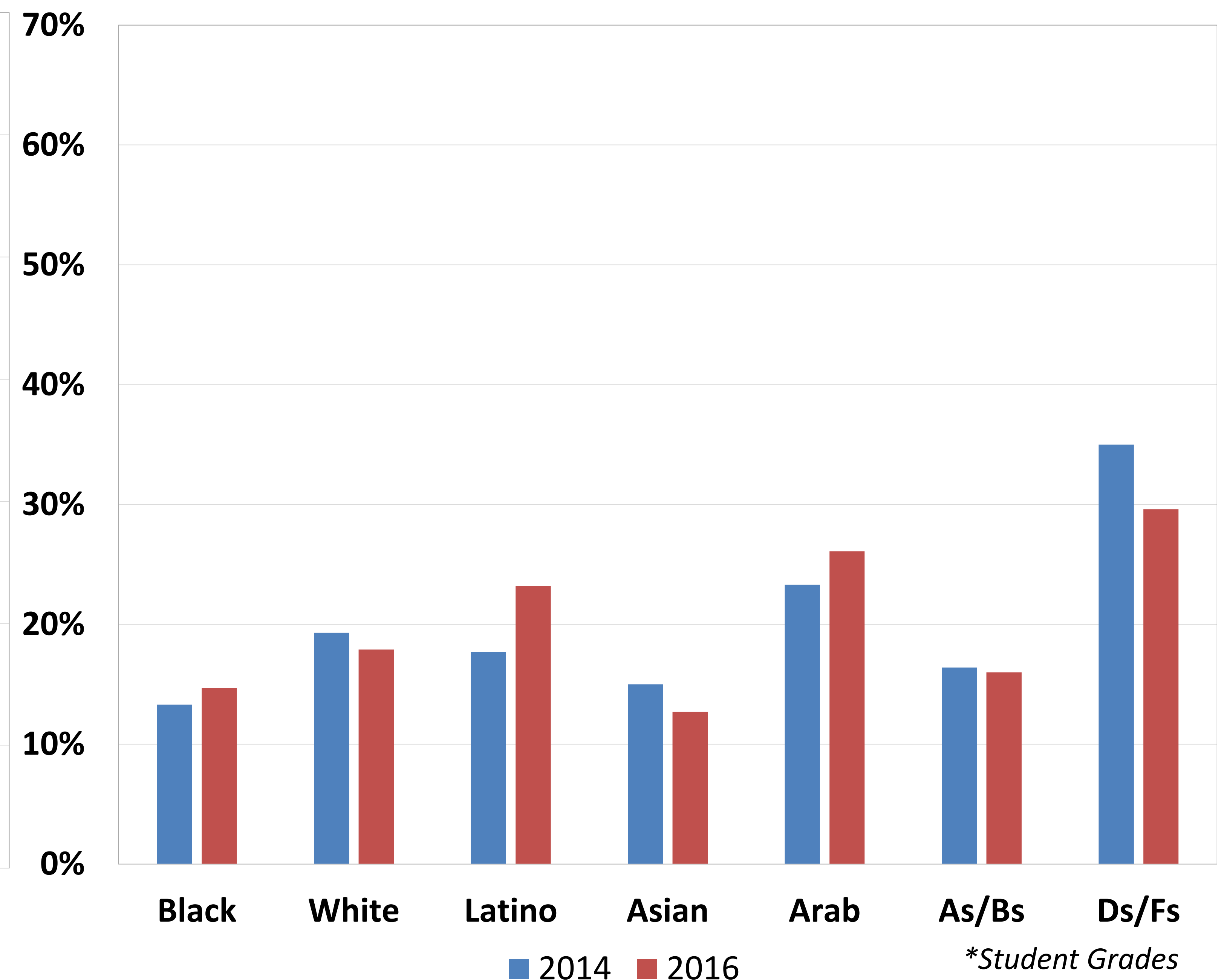

9th & 11th Grade Youth Who Reported Being Bullied on School Property in the Past 12 Months, Washtenaw County



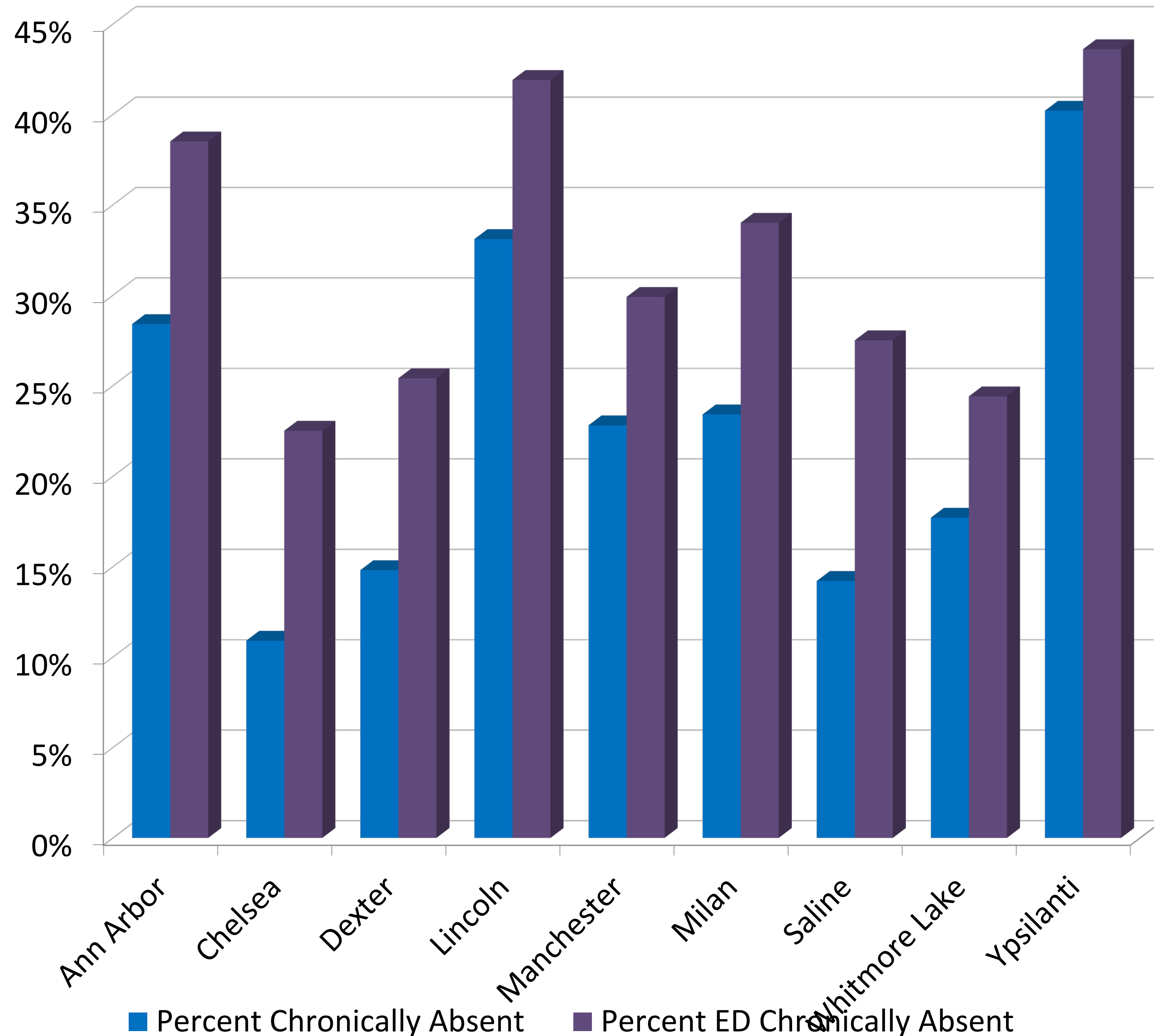

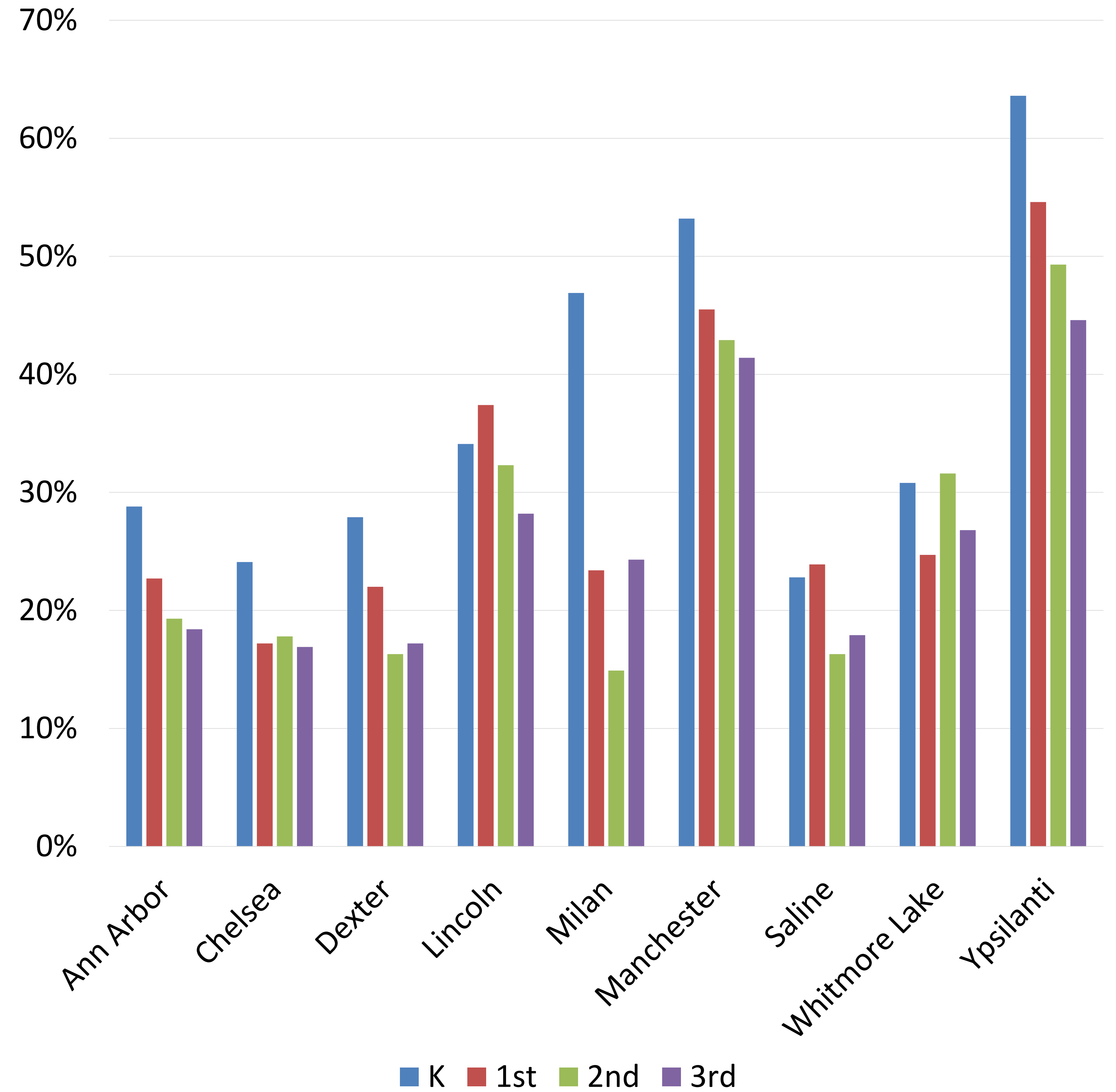

Percent of Students Chronically Absent, K-3



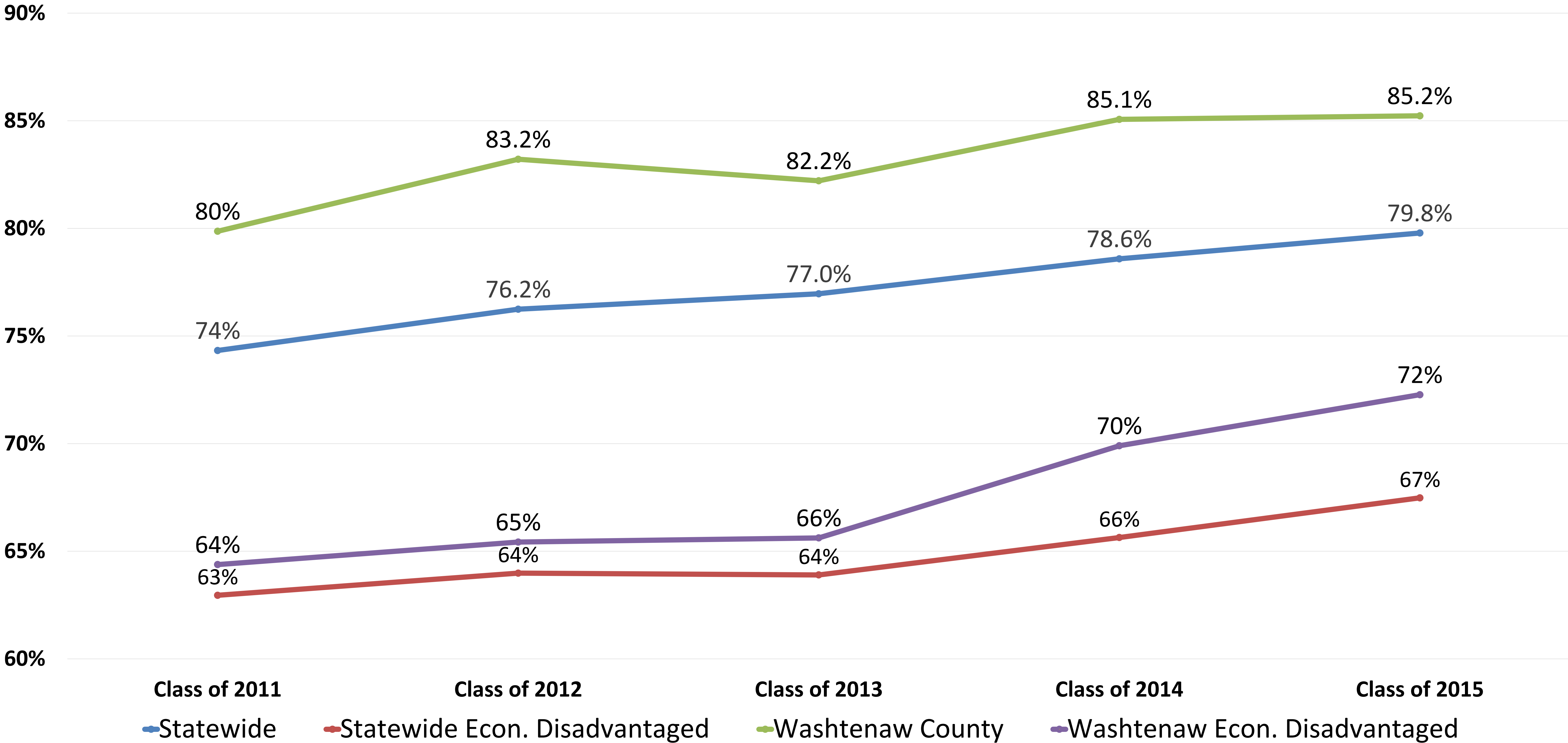

4 Year High School Graduation Rates



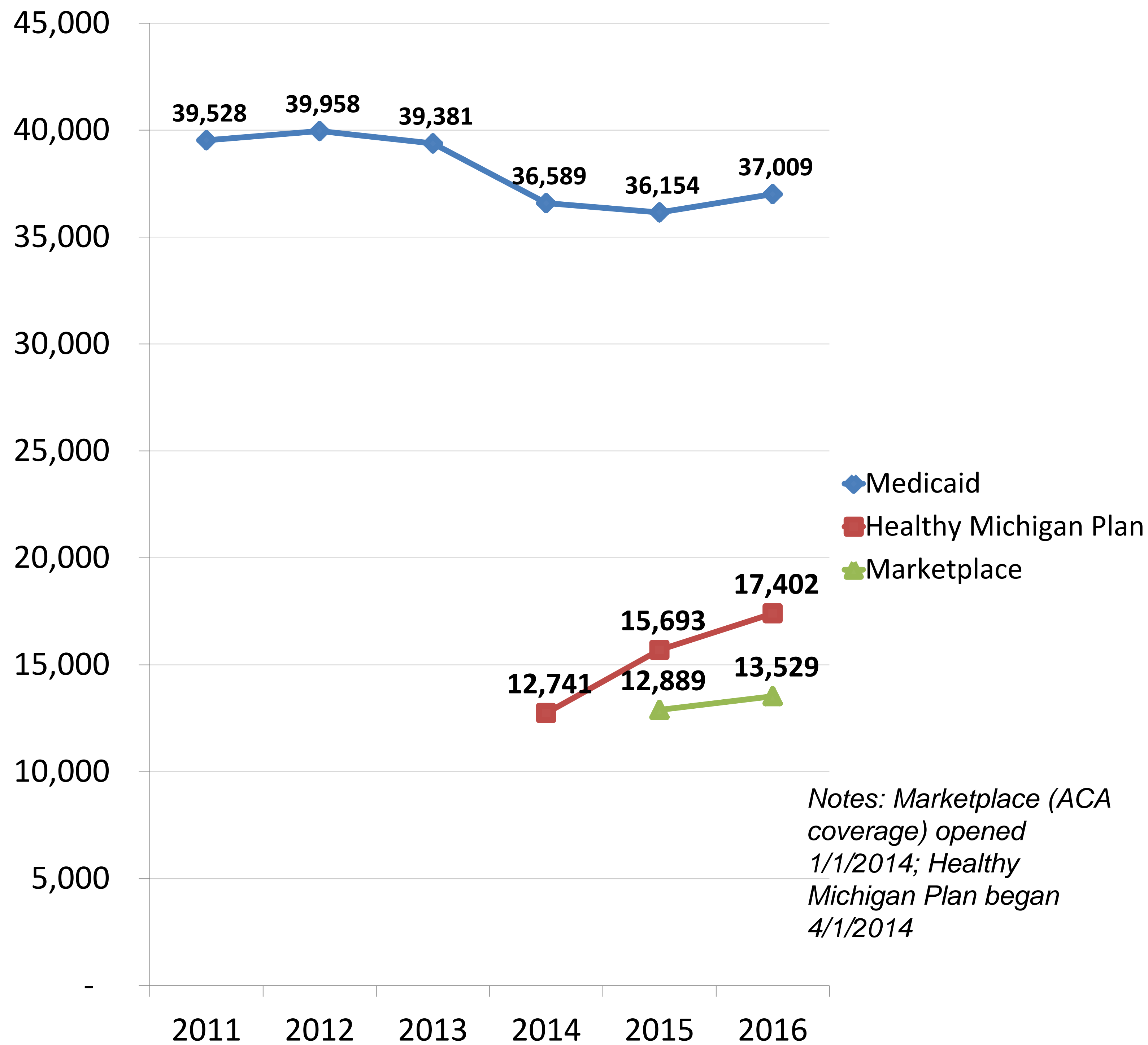

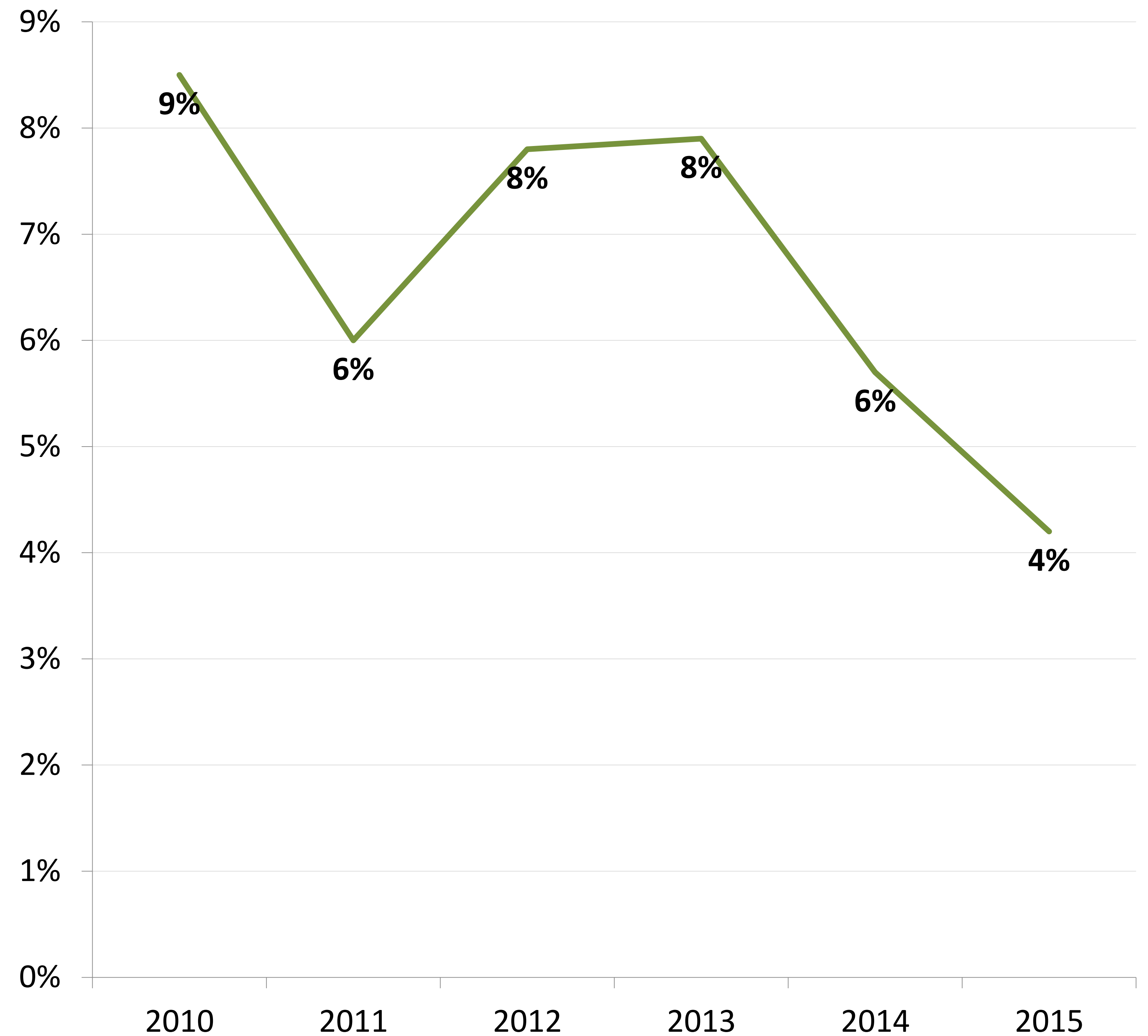

Total % Uninsured Residents, All Income Levels, Washtenaw County



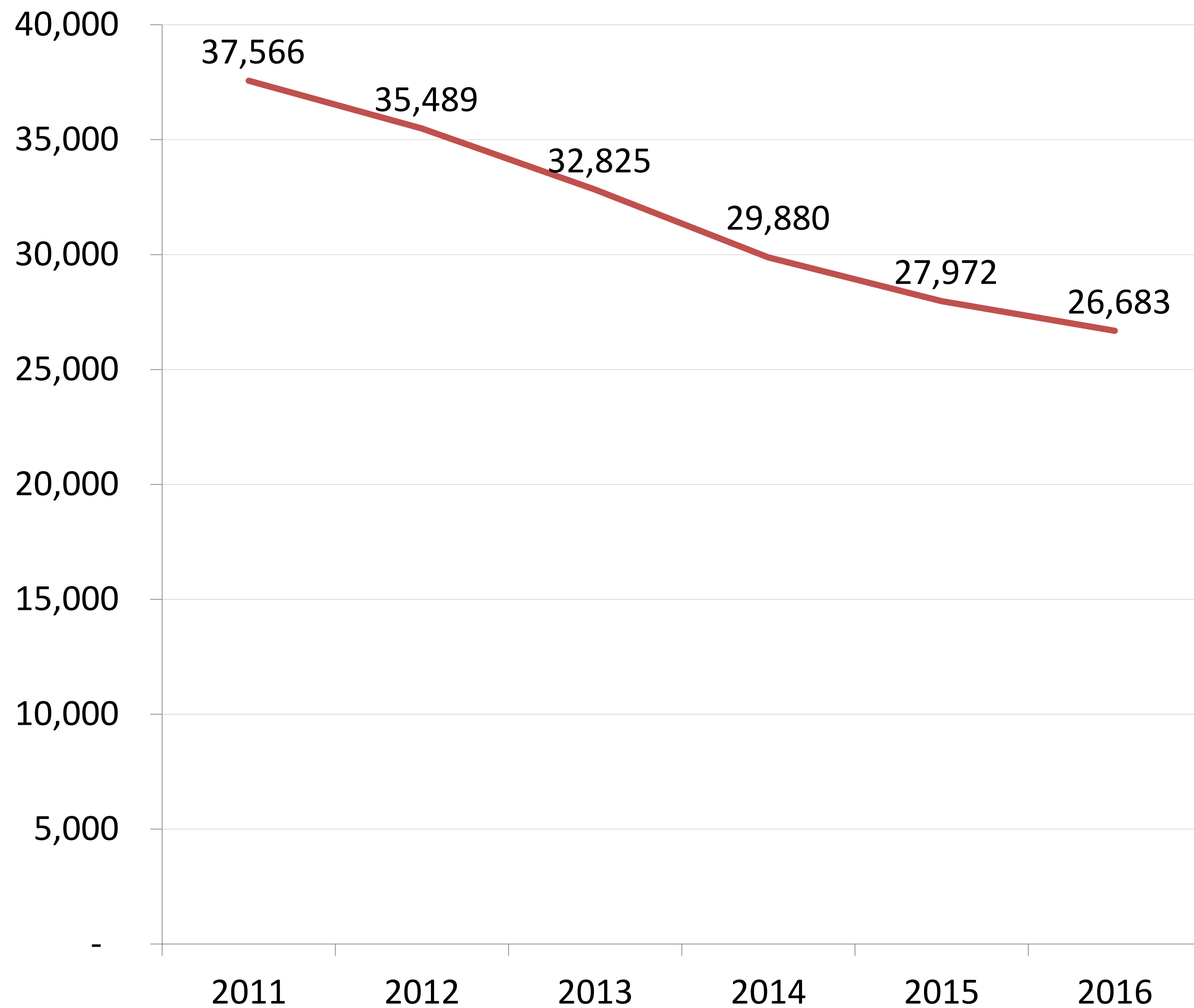

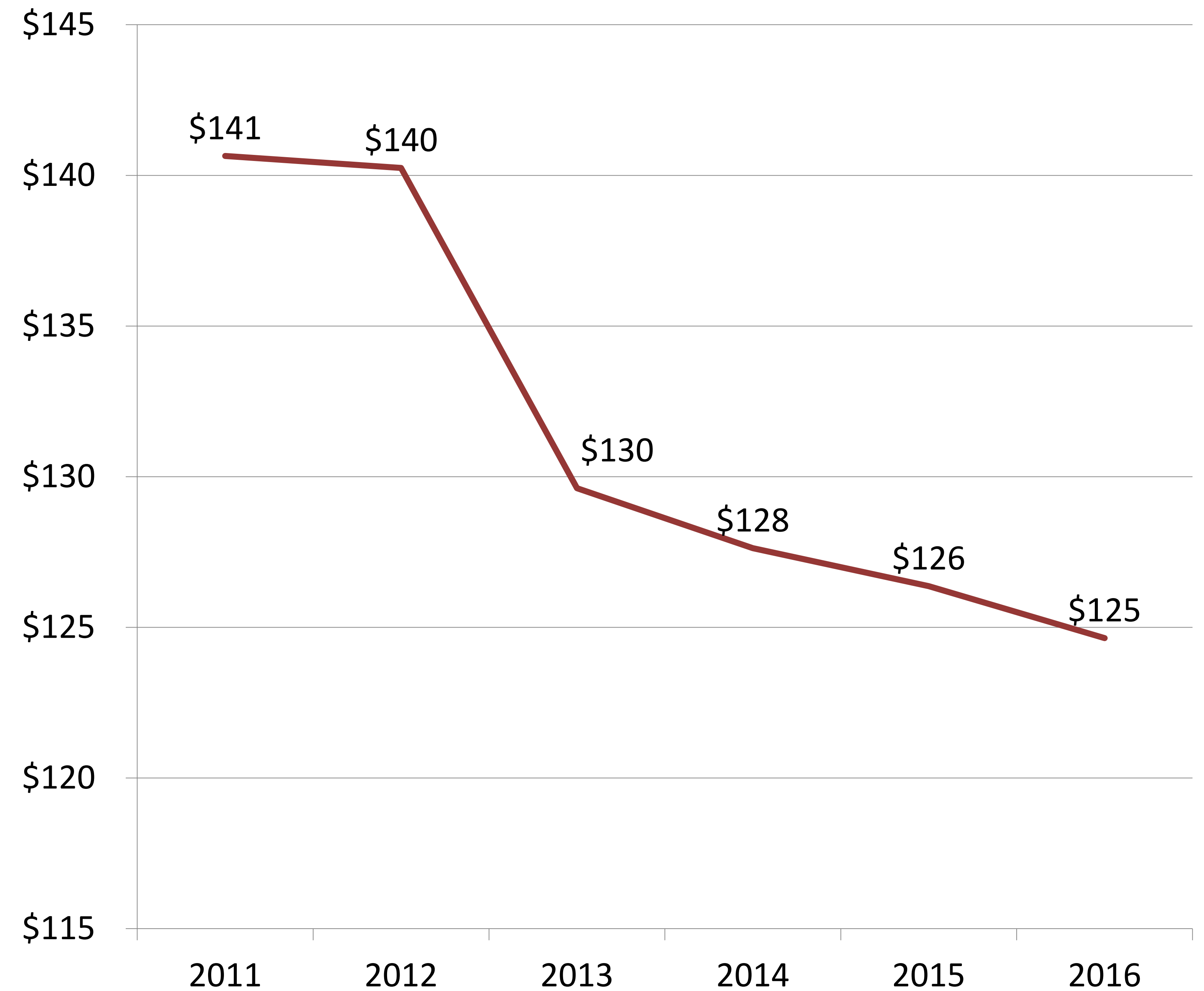

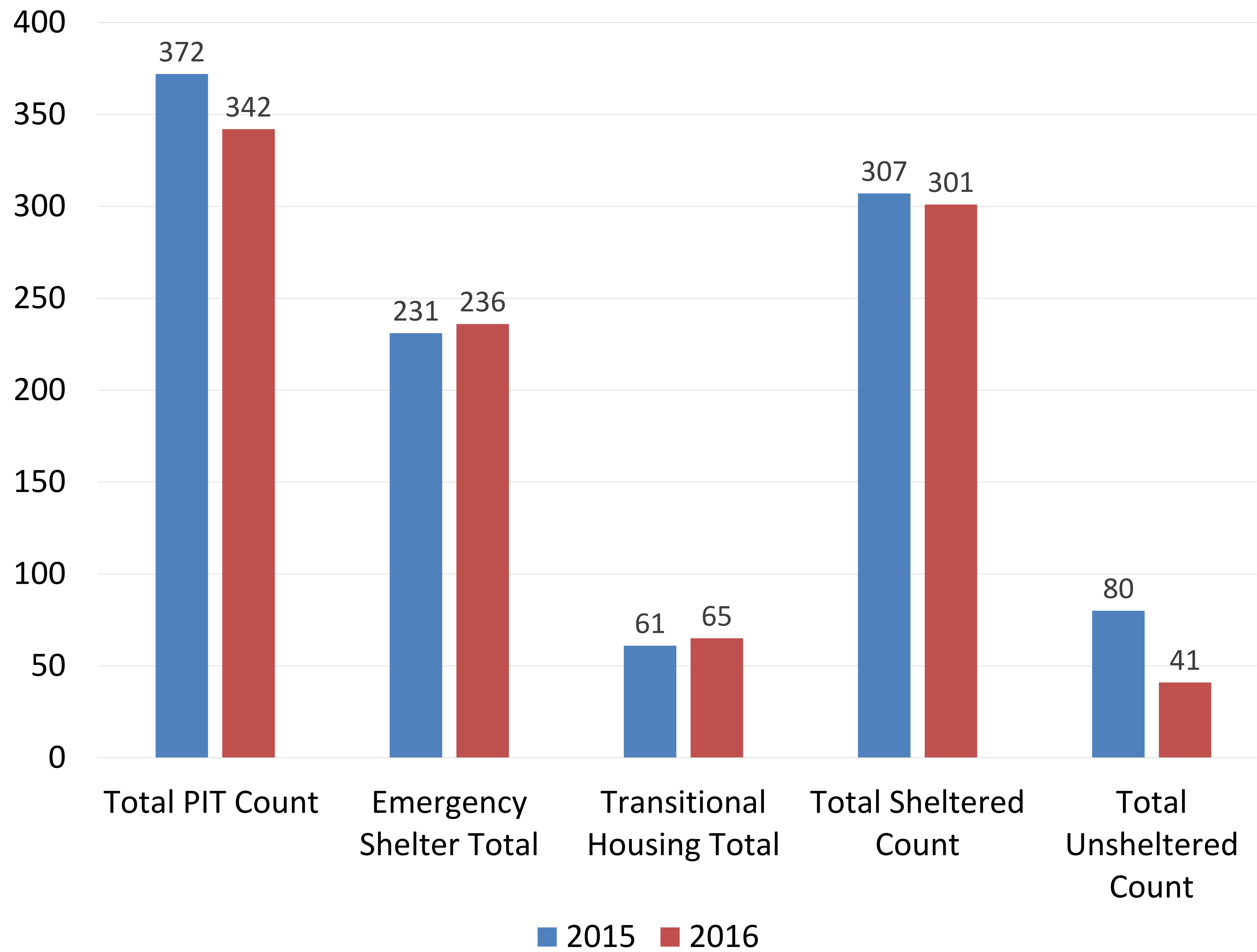

Housing & Homelessness

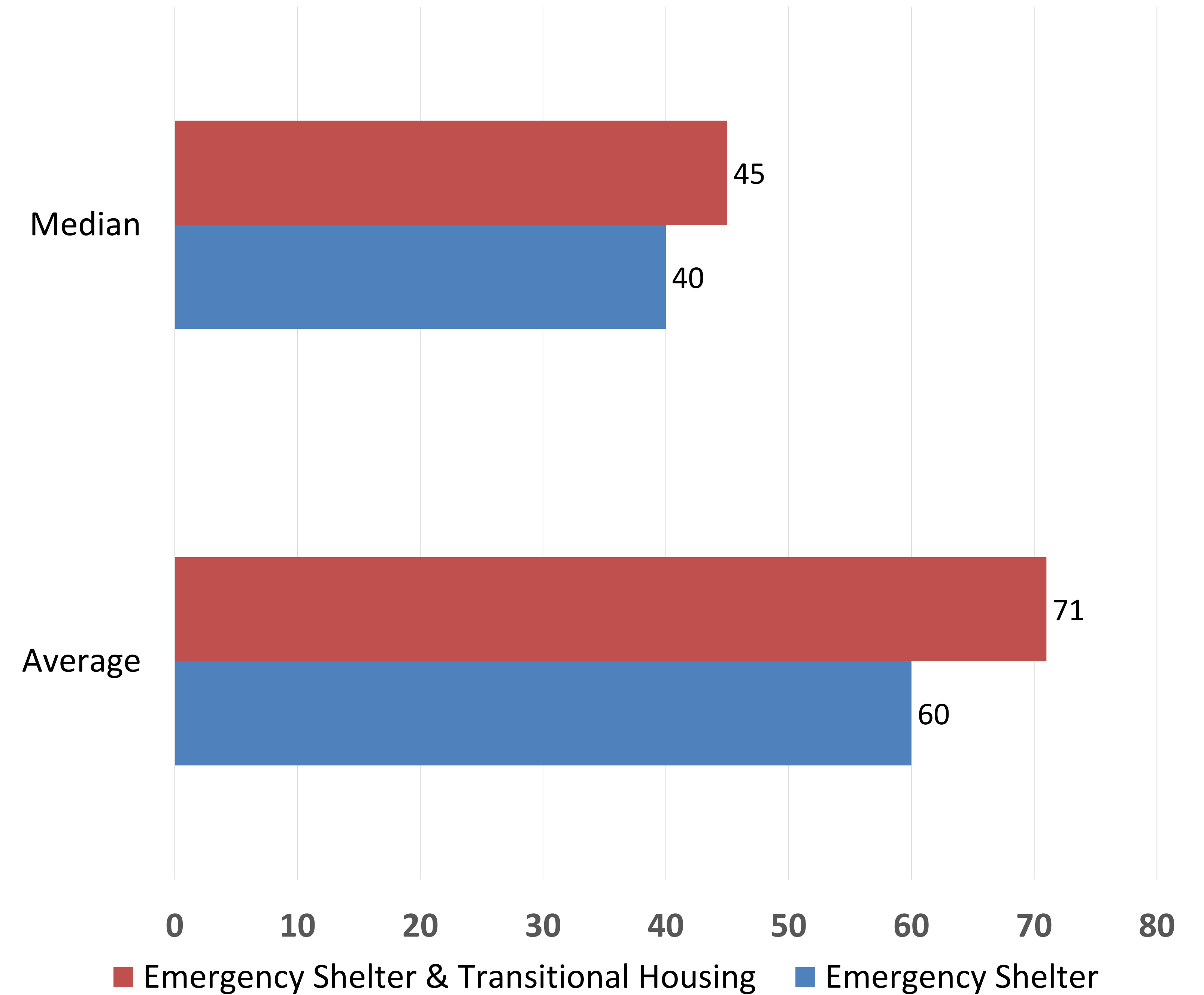
Community Outcome: Reduce the number of people who are experiencing homelessness

From 2015 to 2016, the County's total PIT count decreased 8% and the total unsheltered PIT count decreased 49%. For both years Washtenaw County's homeless population was approximately 3.5% of the state of Michigan's homeless population at a point-in-time.

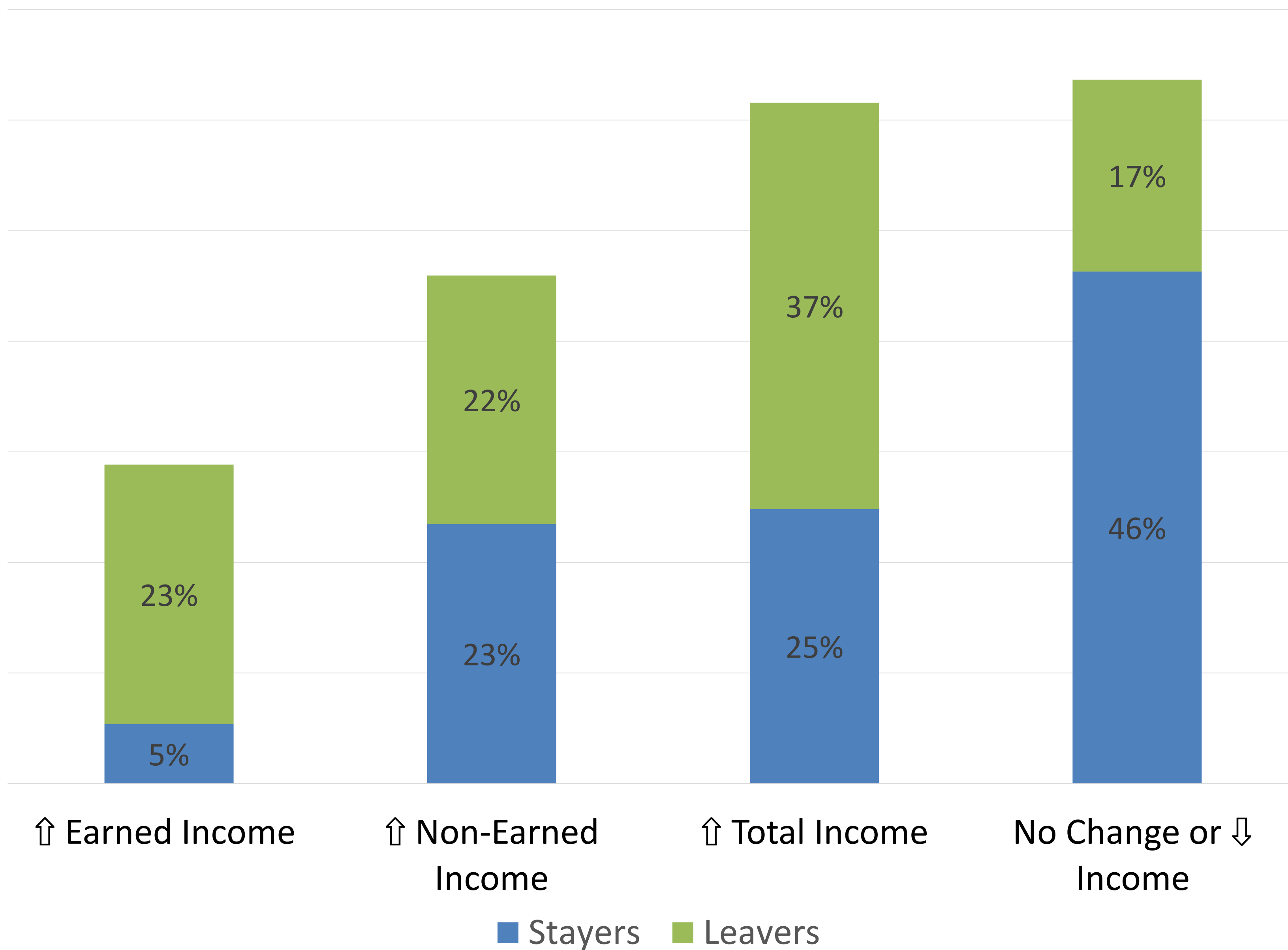
In 2014-2015, the average length of time people are homeless in an ES is 2 months. When Transitional Housing projects are factored in, this average increases to 2.3 months.

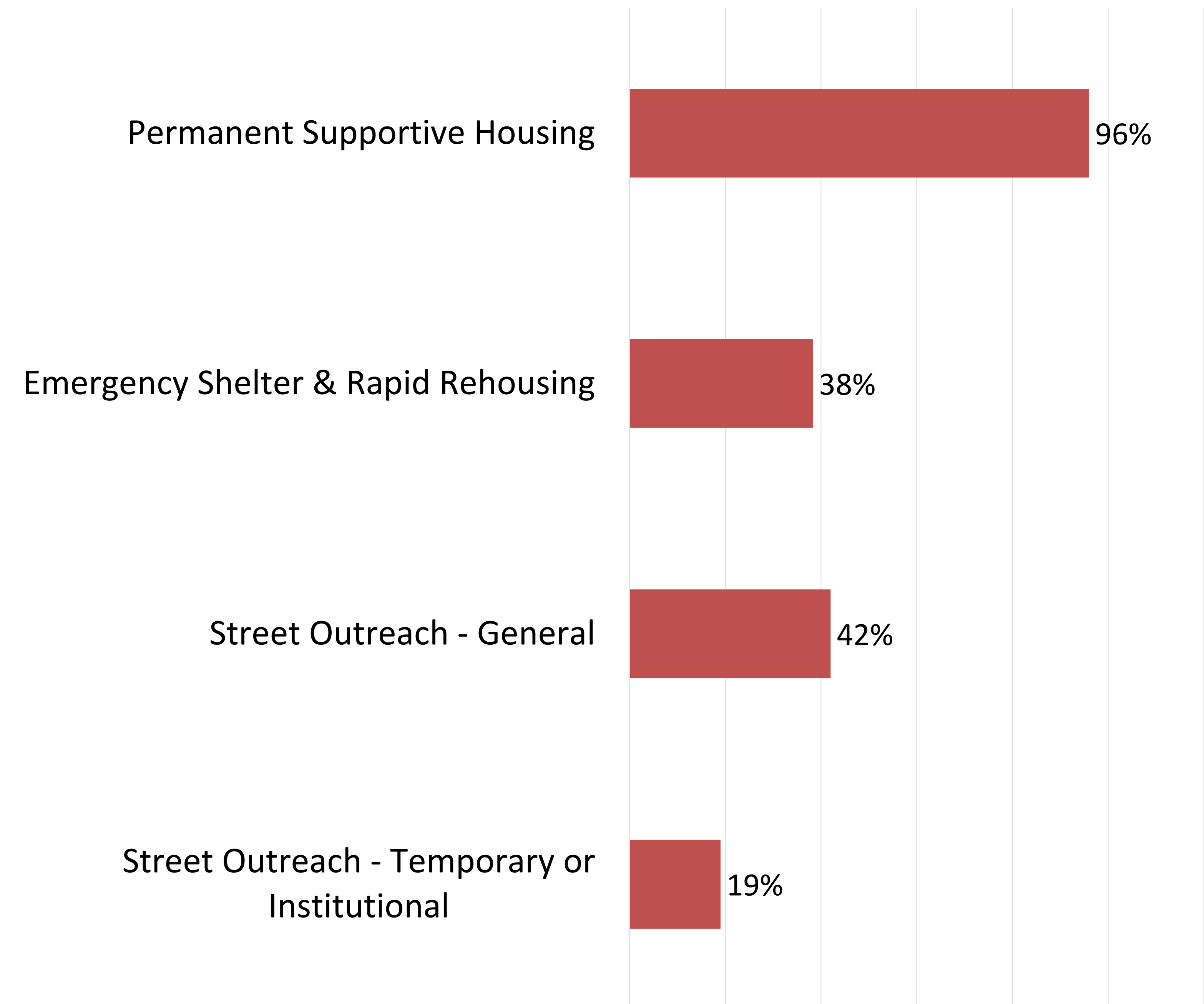
Systems Goal: Decrease the extent to which persons who exit homelessness to permanent housing destinations return to homelessness within two years.

Annual Permanent Housing Placement or Retention Rate, Washtenaw County

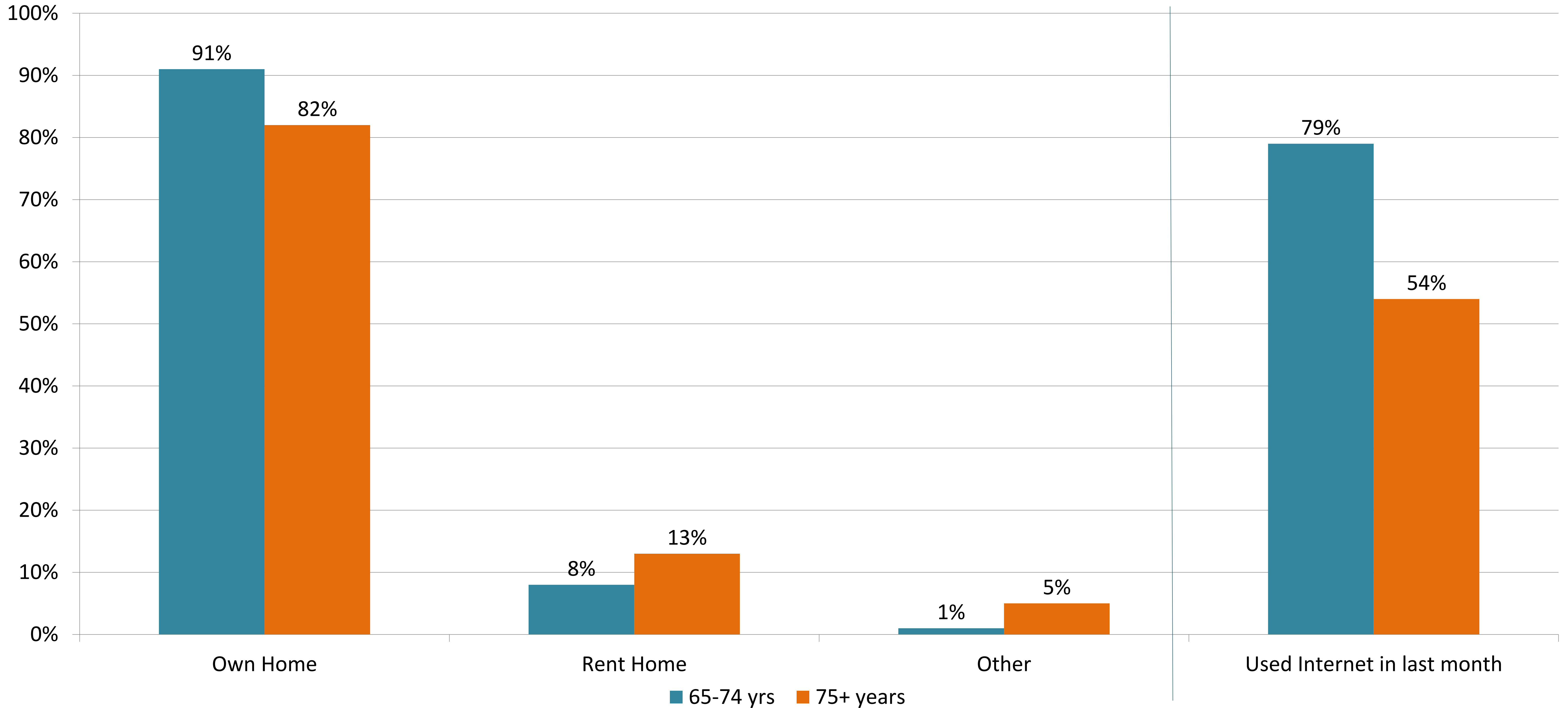

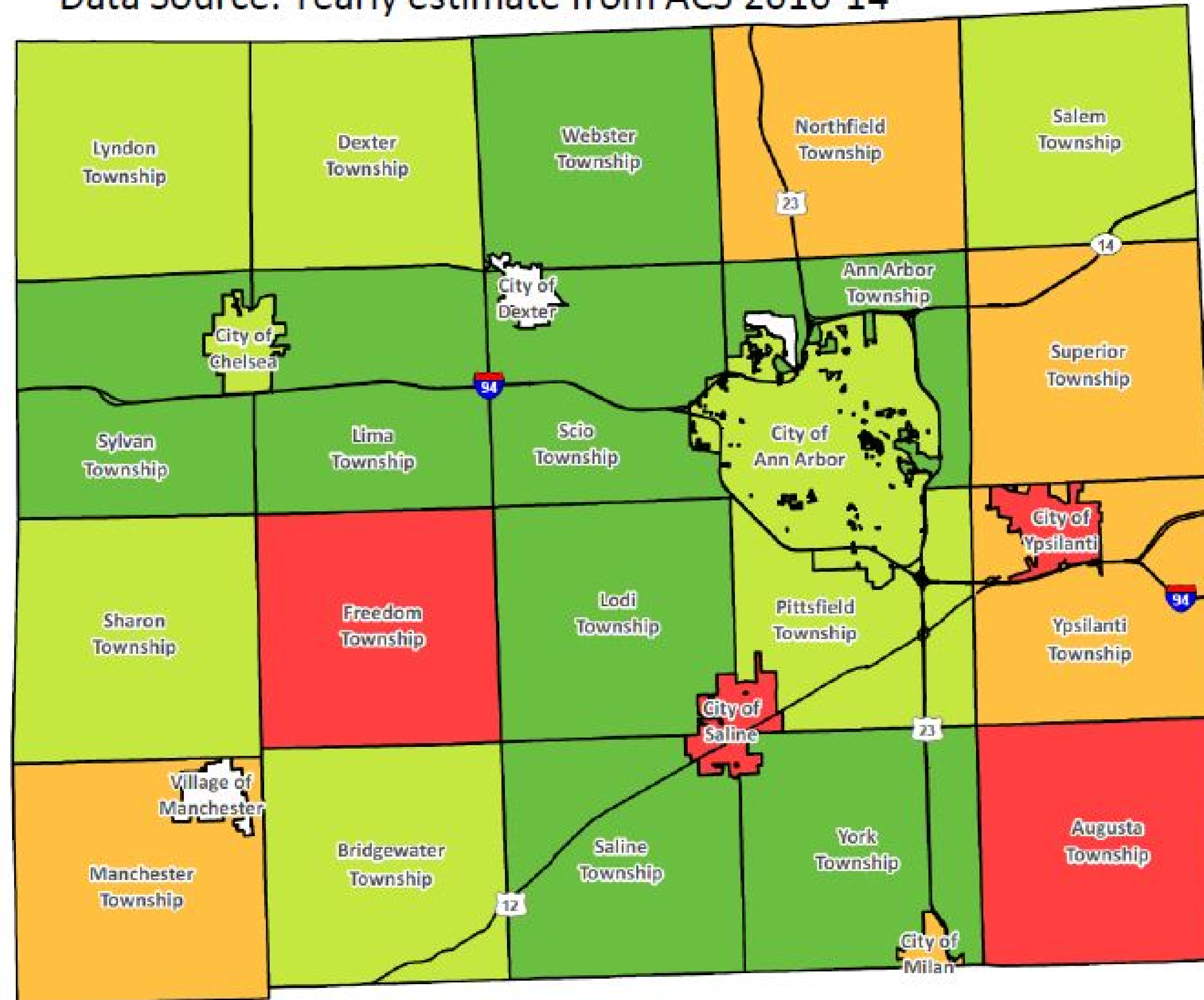

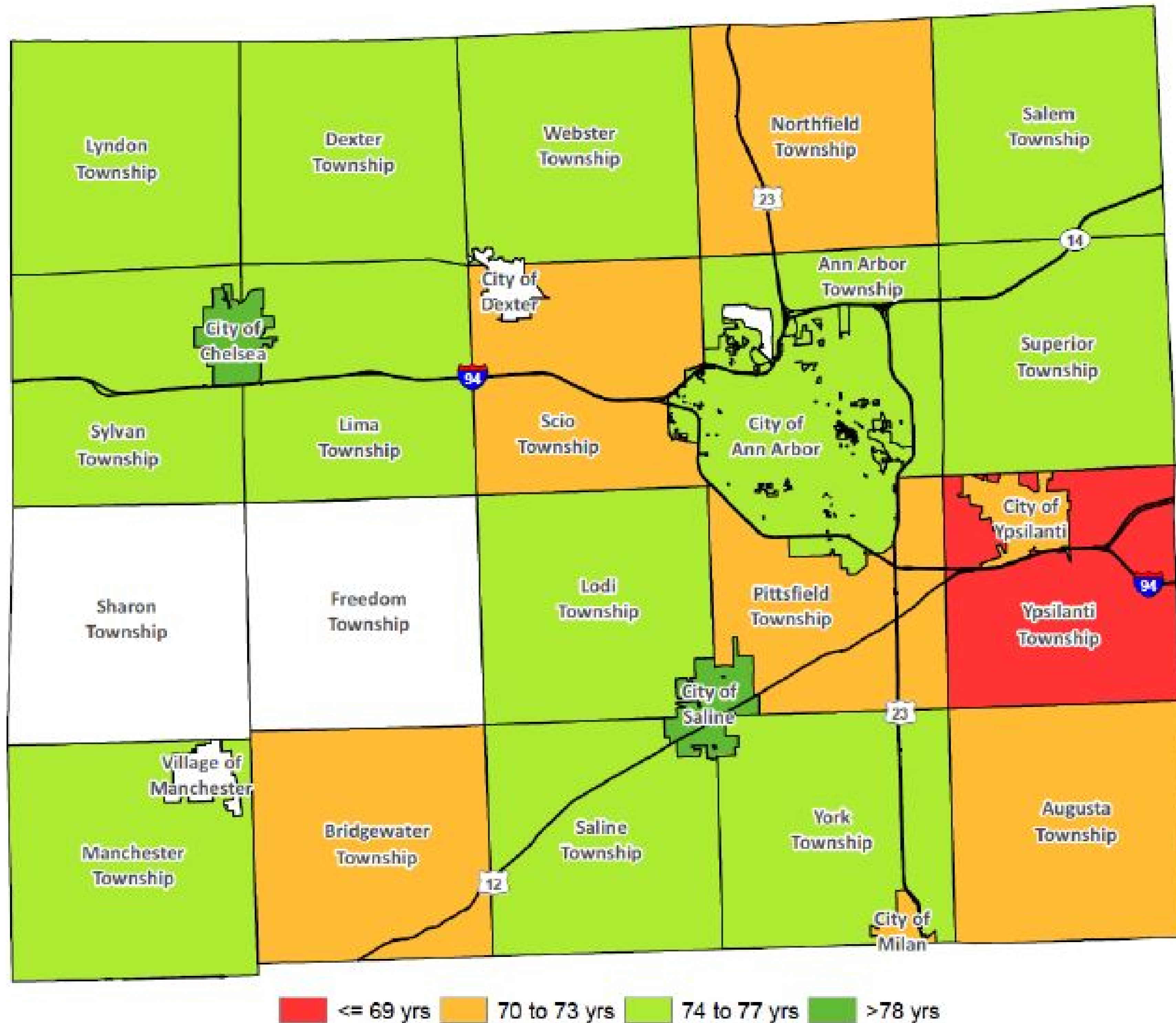
